A Parish Plan - A Blueprint for the Future of Clare.

Your Parish Council proposes to sponsor the development of a Parish Plan for Clare and is holding a launch event on Wednesday 8th October at 7.30pm in the Town Hall.

A Parish Plan is, quite simply, a document that is created by asking the residents and businesses in Clare about their concerns and ambitions for Clare, and then turning those issues into an action plan for the future development of the town.

A Parish Plan will enable the community to record their needs, concerns and aspirations on community, social, economic and environmental issues. This includes housing,

development, highways, transport, health and education matters.

Your Parish Council regards such a document as the means to ensure that Clare develops in a way that residents want it to, and also that Council Taxes are spent appropriately.

In order to ensure that the Parish Plan represents the whole community it is essential that it is developed with as much community input as possible. To begin this process we would like to invite you to our launch event on **Wednesday 8 October** at **7.30pm** in the Town Hall.

Clare Backs West Suffolk Option

Clare Parish Council has been studying all of the options being put forward for changes to local government in Suffolk and has attended most of the meetings held by the various organisations. The Parish Council met on the 18th September and unanimously endorsed the proposal from St Edmundsbury to create 3 Unitary Authorities in Suffolk: North Haven, covering Ipswich and Felixstowe; East Suffolk, including Lowestoft; and West Suffolk with the administration being centred in Bury St Edmunds.

Originally the Boundary Committee had proposed 2 Unitary Authorities: North Haven and the rest of Suffolk grouped as Rural Suffolk. Suffolk County Council on the other hand had proposed One Suffolk: one giant unitary driven from Ipswich. Your Parish Council does not consider that these 2 options are viable: they will not improve the delivery of services locally nor will they enhance local democracy and decision-making.

Clare Parish Council is of the opinion that the St Edmundsbury proposal for 3 Unitary Authorities provides the most effective approach to value-for-money delivery of services combined with increased local democracy.

But we had no idea what to expect on the day!

The weather was beautiful, warm and sunny and from noon until 6pm, Clare was buzzing with visitors and townspeople coming to enjoy



gardens in Clare. The atmosphere throughout Clare was full of warmth and laughter and the scent of flowers. The strawberry and cream sponges couldn't be assembled quickly enough. One visitor shared her 99th birthday with us!

We could not have wished for a more successful day, not only for Clare in Bloom and its funds but also for the benefit of the whole town, as we were able to show Clare at its very best.


The number of helpers totalled 80 and we were delighted to have over 400 visitors to our gardens. All proceeds went to support Clare in Bloom.
